Description of microdata file

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## 1. Introduction

The files for the Survey on Living Conditions 2004 (hereafter ECV 2004) for families and individuals are a dissemination product aimed at users with experience in analysing and processing microdata. This format provides added value to the user, allowing him or her to exploit and analyse data which, due to obvious limitations, the current standard dissemination in the form of tables, publications and reports cannot encompass.

This report, to be specific, describes the microdata file corresponding to the individual questionnaire. This file contains a selection of the variables collected and generated in the survey for the person selected within the family context and is structured around the thematic areas covered by the survey for this statistical unit (level of education, health conditions, work, free time, social relationships, etc.)<sup>1</sup>. A microdata file at level is also available, containing specific information collected and generated by the survey for this statistical unit. This file is provided separately together with its corresponding description.

## 2. Criteria for selection of variables

The ECV covers a broad array of variables and characteristics at family and individual level that need to be processed, adjusted and summarised prior to exploitation. The file described here covers a selection of these variables already prepared for treatment. This selection has been carried out based on criteria of both confidentiality and quality of the information which is detailed below:

### 2.1 Confidentiality criteria

Maintaining statistical secrecy for those supplying information is one of the main guiding principles in statistical activity. Therefore, the dissemination of any individual information collected under the obligation of statistical secrecy should be anonymous and carried out in such a way that none of the identities of the statistical units can be deduced, not even via the content or disaggregation of the published variables.

Therefore, to safeguard this guarantee, the following restrictions have been applied to the individual file of the ECV 2004:

- In no event does it include direct identification variables or personal details (ID n<sup>o</sup>, name, surname, address, telephone n<sup>o</sup>, etc.).
- The maximum geographical disaggregation included is the ZONE (grouping of districts) and provincial capitals.
- The age of the person interviewed is presented in five-yearly bands given its highly identifiable nature in combination with the other demographic variables.
- Standard groupings of variables which characterise the individual and do not allow identification of "singular" units are used (e.g. individuals with minority professions, or with unusual holiday destinations, etc.).
- Numerical variables are not included (e.g. length of journeys, distances to place of study or work, hours dedicated to studying, etc.), except the family weighting and the family and individual identifiers. These variables appear categorised in sufficiently broad ranges or intervals.

- As regards sensitive subject areas covered by the survey, only the most important synthetic indicators have been included once the possibility of identifying registers has been eliminated. Variables of state of health that specify type of disorders and diseases, mobility restrictions, consultations with certain specialists, types of prosthesis used and specific types of donor have been eliminated. Furthermore, participation, membership or help with religious, political or trade union organisations and/or associations has been grouped together in a single general category, "Other Organisations and Associations"...

## 2.2 Quality criteria

Another aspect to pay attention to in the analysis and processing of statistical products is data quality. The quality of the statistical product can be defined using the specific quality factors promoted by EUROSTAT: Relevance, accuracy and reliability, timeliness and punctuality, coherence and comparability, accessibility and clarity.

In this case and for the selection of the variables to be included in the individual microdata file of the ECV 2004, we have focused on the first two aspects: relevance (interest of the data for the final user) and the accuracy and reliability of the information.

### 2.2.1 Relevance

Given the great quantity of variables collected by the survey, we have attempted to synthesise and include those that are supposed to be of the greatest interest and relevance for the general survey user. Thus the following considerations have been made:

- Variables of negligible analytical interest have not been included, as is the case with certain work and free time variables (e.g. type of time control at work, distribution of days off in the different holiday periods, working hours during holidays, etc.).
- On the other hand, detailed variables of the subjects most demanded by users in recent years have been included, such as use and level of Euskera (Basque language), participation in household chores, the use of ICT during leisure time, etc..
- Self-classification variables<sup>2</sup> have not been included so as to avoid problems of objectivity and comparability in the estimations derived from these variables (e.g. data of employment, unemployment, etc.).

### 2.2.2 Accuracy and reliability

In any sampling survey, the main limitation consists of the fact that information is available solely for the sample units and not for the whole of the target population. The sampling design of the survey will shed light on the level of representativity that we can attain with the information collected.

In the case of the ECV, although the sample of households is selected stratified by ZONE (or grouping of districts), the representativity required is at least Province-level for the main variables and crosses of the survey. However, the great quantity of variables and the high level of detail that can be reached with the variables included in this file do not guarantee the statistical significance of all the exploitations or analyses that can be carried out on this data.

The conclusions reached from the studies or analyses carried out on the data are the responsibility of the final user. However, to get an idea of the quality of the information for a specific cross or disaggregation the user is recommended to consult the tables of sampling errors of the survey. ### **3. Register design**

The individual microdata file for the ECV 2004 is in text format, with fixed columns and structured around the subject areas covered by the survey for this statistical unit. The description of the variables, the type, the possible states and the exact positions in the file are described in the Excel file Estructura\_individuos\_ECV04.xls which is attached together with all the documentation related to the microdata file ECV 2004.

### **4. Synthetic indicators**

Some of the variables included in this microdata file do not correspond exactly with questions from the individual questionnaire, but rather are synthetic variables deriving from the exploitation of various items or questions from this questionnaire. These variables are known as “Synthetic Variables” and their generation and relation with the other variables is described in the Excel file Estructura\_individuos\_ECV04.xls which is attached together with all the documentation related to the microdata file ECV 2004.
